Dengue is defined by a combination of ≥ 2 clinical findings in a febrile person who traveled to or lives in a dengue-endemic area.

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Clinical findings include nausea, vomiting, rash, aches and pains, a positive tourniquet test, leukopenia, and the following warning signs: abdominal pain or tenderness, persistent vomiting, clinical fluid accumulation, mucosal bleeding, lethargy, restlessness, liver enlargement, and postural hypotension.

The most common hemorrhagic manifestations are mild and include a positive tourniquet test, skin hemorrhages (petechiae, hematomas), epistaxis (nose bleed), gingival bleeding (gum bleed), and microscopic hematuria.

Dengue hemorrhagic fever is a condition which is caused due to any of the four kinds of dengue viruses, namely, DENV- 1, DENV-2, DENV- 3 and DENV-4. These viruses are generally transmitted through mosquito of a certain species known as *Aedes aegypti*.

Dengue and dengue hemorrhagic fever (DHF) result from infection by any of four serotypes of dengue viruses. Transmission occurs through the bite of infected *Aedes* mosquitoes, principally *Aedes aegypti*, which is also the principal urban vector of yellow fever.

Clinical manifestations of exposure to DV range from mild dengue fever (DF) to dengue hemorrhagic fever (DHF), a plasma leakage syndrome with a potential life-threatening form known as "dengue shock syndrome" (DSS) [1, 2, 8] In the Americas, Brazil accounts for 70% of reported cases of dengue in recent years [9].

Dengue fever is a mosquito-borne tropical disease caused by the dengue virus. Symptoms typically begin three to fourteen days after infection. This may include a high fever, headache, vomiting, muscle and joint pains, and a characteristic skin rash. Recovery generally takes two to seven days. In a small proportion of cases, the disease develops into severe dengue, also known as dengue hemorrhagic fever, resulting in bleeding, low levels of blood platelets and blood plasma leakage, or into dengue

Dengue is a febrile illness caused by a flavivirus transmitted by Aedes aegypti or Aedes albopictus mosquitoes during a blood

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meal. There are four dengue virus (DENV) types (DENV-1, DENV-2, DENV-3, and DENV-4), all of which are capable of inducing severe disease (dengue hemorrhagic fever [DHF]/dengue shock syndrome [DSS]).
