In Good Wives, Nasty Wenches, and Anxious Patriarchs, Brown argues that gender inextricably linked to all other forms of servitude. Brown writes that laws were, "aimed at severing the ties of masculinity that bound enslaved and servant men together" (Brown, Good Wives, Nasty Wenches, and Anxious Patriarchs 181).
