Trial Jury A trial jury, also known as a petit jury, decides whether the defendant committed the crime as charged in a criminal case, or whether the defendant injured the plaintiff in a civil case. Consists of 6-12 people. Trials are generally public, but jury deliberations are private.

Types of Juries | United States Courts

Jury selection. If the trial will be held before a jury, the defense and prosecution select the jury through a question-and-answer process called "voir dire." In federal courts and many state courts, the judge carries out this process using questions suggested by the attorneys, as well as questions that the judge comes up with on his or her own.

As a trial consultant, during jury selection my entire focus is on trying to predict the behavior of the jurors and how they ultimately will influence each other within the jury group. In contrast, attorneys have a different perspective and additional tasks during jury selection - they must stand up before the court, ask the right questions, respond in the moment, and begin to establish rapport with the jury.

16 Simple Rules for Better Jury Selection

Juries of six to twelve persons are selected from the jury pool. The size of jury varies from state to state and depends to some extent on the type of case at trial. In civil cases, especially in courts of limited jurisdiction, the standard size in many jurisdictions is becoming six, which can be increased by stipulation of both parties.

How Courts Work

Jury Selection and "Voir Dire" "Voir Dire" refers to the second stage of jury procedures, and is the process by which the court and the attorneys narrow down the pool of jurors to the 12 people that will decide the case. The process for voir dire varies from state to state, and even from judge to judge. Normally, however, the judge and attorneys will interview each juror about their backgrounds and beliefs.

Rule 24. Trial Jurors | Federal Rules of Criminal ...

When a jury trial is about to begin, the trial court judge requests a panel of prospective jurors to be sent to the courtroom from the jury assembly room so that the jury selection process can begin. After reporting to a courtroom, the prospective jurors are first required to swear that they will truthfully answer all questions asked about their qualifications to serve as jurors in the case.
